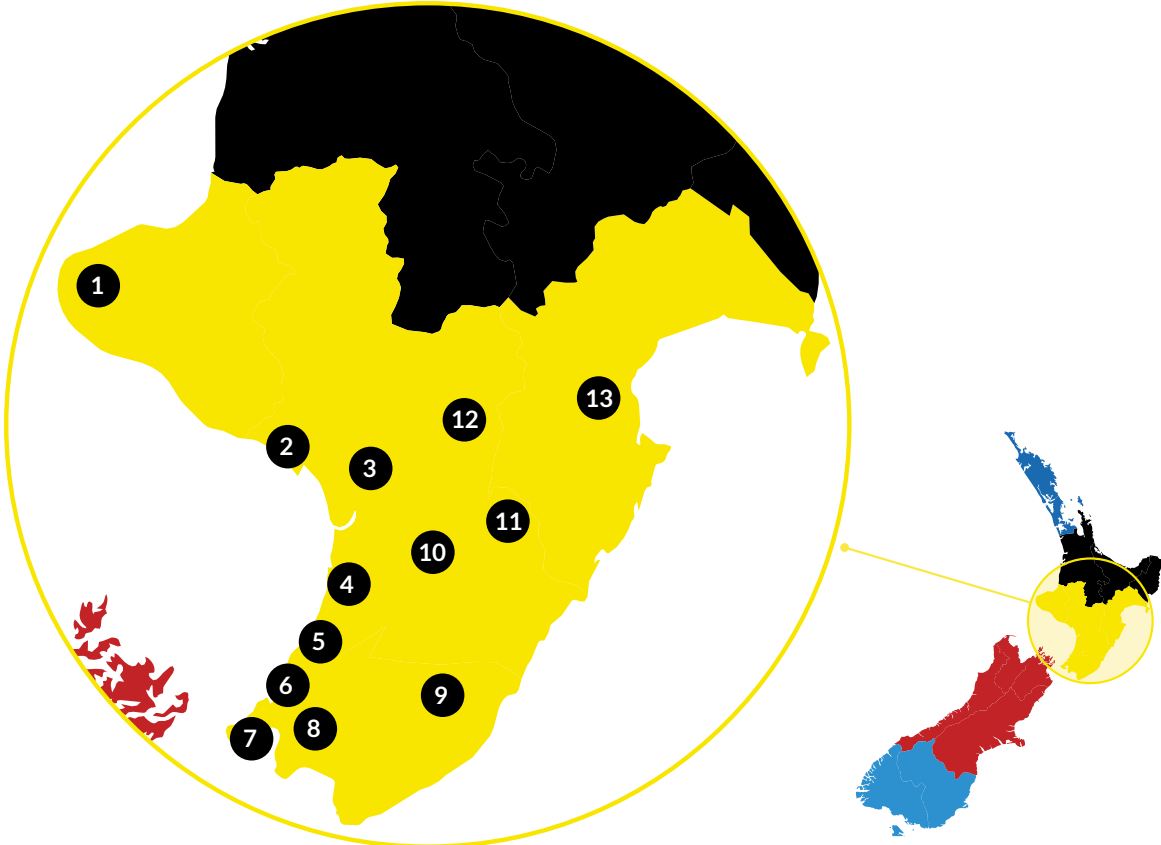

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Chair and CEO Report

Welcome to the 2022 Annual Report. It is our pleasure to jointly present this report on the Netball Central Zone activity during the past year.

2022 proved to be a year that showed how resilient the netball community is and our ability to adapt and grow together was evident. Our netball centres within Netball Central Zone have done a phenomenal job at providing a place for our members to thrive.

We are extremely proud of the staff at Netball Central Zone, our Centres, Satellites, Players, Umpires, bench officials, committee, and board members, along with all the volunteers who deliver our game. A huge thank you to all of our community, partners, supporters, and each other for making our game so special.

The heart of our Zone is always our netball community and collective collaboration is fundamental to our success. We were particularly pleased with the work of Community team, led by Ann Hay, and how the relationship between Zone and centres has flourished over the past year.

Ann has also continued to build success as our Umpire and Bench Lead. We continue to have the majority of umpires in national squads coming from Netball Central Zone, for which we are incredibly proud of. But also, a huge thank you to our Netball Centres and umpire coaches who volunteer to provide coach development opportunities in order to continue fantastic succession in this area. Our

bench officials relished endless opportunities in 2022 with all of the representative programmes being back in full force – although we possibly all could forget the wet and wonderful U18's in Christchurch. We so thank you for the tireless efforts by you all, as you are an integral part of our game.

Unlocking more Coach Developers continues to be something that we will collaboratively work with our Centres on. Our coaching modules, but more specifically informal opportunities to learn is a focus of Kelly Hynson our Coach Lead alongside all of our Centres. Coach succession planning is also an integral part not only for Clubs and Schools but also representative programmes too as we prepare for 2023.

Last year was the newly created opportunity for NetballSmart Centre Activators in Taranaki, Manawatu and Hawke's Bay. We can report that all areas have had impact via visibility and understanding and we are grateful for Taela Brown, Kelston Reynolds, Ashleigh-Kate Araroa-Waarea, Rebecca Boyd and Asher Grapes for their contributions in this area.

Carla van der Merwe continues to do a fantastic job to fulfil the purpose of NetballSmart being a comprehensive holistic Injury Prevention Programme (IPP)

Our biggest playing group continues to be those that are involved with FutureFerns, and we were delighted to have Bianca van Dyk join us at the beginning of the year in the Participation Lead role. Bianca thoroughly enjoyed working with the wider community and would enthusiastically share the successes that she witnessed.

The continued success of our performance plan ensures we remain focused on leading the country in performance on the court. With Central Manawa being able to partake in a full competition this year, the appointment of the new coaching and management staff was critical, with Anna Andrews-Tasola as Head Coach; John Atkins and Ngarama Milner-Olsen as the two Assistant Coaches, and Sarona Sullivan as Team Manager forming a formidable team.

Central Manawa saw experienced players and new player emerged and put their hands up for selection. The team had a great build up to the season with regular match play against the Pulse and capitalised on their opportunities to overcome a well established Mainland team in the Grand Final. This is Central Manawa's 4th Championship in 5

seasons since the inception of the league, which is an outstanding record.

Our success within our Central Manawa programme would not be made possible without the incredible work that our Netball Centres do in ensuring opportunities for these players to learn and grow, we thank you for all of your work with your performance programmes. This of course is further developed with the high calibre of coaching personnel in our zone, one that continues to set us apart from the rest.

We welcomed back head coach Yvette Mc-Causland-Durie back after her year away. The Te Wānanga o Raukawa Pulse had a new playing group to embed in, including some new faces in our Management Team. We welcomed Anna Andrews-Tasola as Assistant Coach and Ari Carroll as our physiotherapist alongside our Team and Operations Manager Jill Clapcott who was back for a third year. The playing group capitalised on the opportunities available throughout the season, maximising bonus points were possible to cement a home grand final at TSB Arena. Nothing could have prepared us for the incredibly start to that Grand Final, and the team never looked back, pushing the Northern Stars into multiple substitutions early on, for which they would not recover. The Te Wānanga o Raukawa Pulse claiming their third championship convincingly 56-37.

As well as what was a tremendous team effort, the season did showcase some strong individual performances that were rewarded with the naming of Kelly Jury, Whitney Souness and Maddy Gordon in the Silver Ferns wider squad for 2022/23; with Tiana Metuarau and Kristiana Manu'a being selected in the Development Squad.

Financial sustainability remains a priority of the Board and management team. The Netball Central Zone board welcomed the formation of the working group (Snowball) that was formed to work through affiliation fees. We thank Ann for her work with the Snowball hui and all those that were involved for their time also. We are pleased to be able to continue to keep the Zone affiliation fee at a minimal level to make netball in our region accessible, but still allows for us to operate efficiently in the Community area, enabling us to work collaboratively together to connect and inspire our communities through netball.

Our partnerships with funders and sponsors remain critical and the strong relationships we have with each allows us to continue to deliver to on and off the court.

Umpire Report

Umpires from the centres across the Central Zone continue to achieve highly, both nationally and internationally. There were 6 umpires appointed to the National Squad of 14, with Angela Armstrong-Lush and Gareth Fowler being appointed to the ANZ Premiership Final, and Marly Howard appointed to the Synergy Hair National League Final. Our watchlist umpires also got a taste of SHNL and ANZ Premiership with Jamie Manuel reserving a SHNL game and Caleb Binns debuting in SHNL and reserving an ANZ game.



Angela and Gareth, along with Kenneth Metekingi were appointed to umpire at the Commonwealth games, with Angela and Gareth appointed to the gold Medal match which is a significant achievement.

With borders opening there were many more opportunities for our umpires to travel internationally or be appointed to international events in NZ. International Men's netball also provided an opportunity for umpires with Gracey Farquharson being appointed to the Men's Fast 5 event.

In each of the three main national events, U18's, Opens and NZSS, an umpire from Central was appointed to the final. This is testament to the work these umpires do, and the support they receive from coaches in their centres.

Umpire coach support had a strong focus in 2022 with the addition of 5 new umpire coach developers to support our network of over 120 umpire coaches. In 2022 we trialed communities of support for umpire coaches, which took place over zoom. We continued with live observations and utilised local tournaments to observe and mentor coaches, and to provide coaches with opportunities to work as tournament panels.

Netball Central Zone have continued with the Advanced and Developing Squads although programmes have been interrupted at times. We have been fortunate to have Kate Smith lead our developing squad programme. Umpires from both squads are showing great growth and we look forward to watching them develop in years to come.

The future of umpiring looks bright across the zone. Thank you to all of the centres and volunteers in centres who support umpires, we appreciate you.

Community Coaching

Our focus on building and nurturing sustainable, locally-lead learning and development for coaches continued to spark creative ways to deliver opportunities. A key message for 2022 was to understand the different demographics in a Centre and tailoring learning to meet the needs of that group. This is a strategy we all continue to work together on to increase engagement in Learning and Development opportunities.

Netball Wellington ran a hugely successful programme, focusing on building a community of practice and support with a cohort of coaches who were on a similar stage in their coaching journey. A number of coaches completed their Level 1 Award but the greater success was the connections, collaboration and a feeling of value that was created within the group. They celebrated the completion of their programme with a dinner and the Wellington team received high praise and much appreciation for putting the programme together. Netball Wellington look forward to continuing with similar programmes in 2023.

Netball Manawatu continued to provide coach development alongside their player development programmes and Netball Kāpiti have provided coach development alongside their Performance Programme pilot in the latter part of 2022. It's encouraging to see Centres looking at each of their player programmes and layering in

coach development, providing more accessibility to more coaches.

A large portion of learning and development came in the online space with a number of opportunities provided across the zone for both Coaches and Coach Developers. We have collaborated with Coach Leads from other Zones to bring online learning and will continue to grow this in 2023 with a national calendar of Learning and Development opportunities to both these groups.

We ran our first in-house Coach Developer training in April 2022, in partnership with Nuku Ora with oversight from Kelly Curr from Sport New Zealand. This was a collaboration with our Umpire Coach Developers and we had a total of 11 player Coach Developers and 4 Umpire Coach Developers in attendance. The programme is traditionally held over 2 days but attendees have found this a barrier to attendance, which gave us an opportunity to be innovative with the way the programme was delivered. We delivered the programme in 1 online session followed with a 1 day in-person session which is a model that is being further explored by Nuku Ora as a way forward for introductory Coach Developer workshops. The programme was lead by Kelly Hynson as Lead Trainer and Ann Hay as Trainer along with external Trainers from Touch NZ and Sport Manawatu. This was a great professional development opportunity for both Ann and Kelly that further enables us to support the NCZ and NNZ Coach Developer network.

Co-delivery opportunities were given to some of our new Coach Developers who have been through introductory training. Catherine Balt and Kat Kerr joined Kelly in co-delivery of workshops as part of their 2022 development plans. We also welcomed Sandra Edge back as a Coach Developer for Netball Wellington which is such a privilege to have someone of her standing delivering learning



opportunities in this Centre. At the close of 2022, we had 18 Coach Developers who are at different stages of their journey. The focus for our Coach Developers in 2023 is to provide local opportunities and support for them to be more active in their Centre through court-side kōrero, communities of support or social learning, observations and feedback, 1-on-1 support and framework / non-framework workshops.

2022 was an extremely satisfying season for the Te Wānanga o Raukawa Pulse team who won our third ANZ Premiership title with an outstanding final match against the Stars. Gaining the minor premiership title after Round 14 was significant in achieving the title, allowing us to host the Grand Final and making the most of our home court advantage.

Players and management had to be extremely resourceful and flexible in 2022 as multiple draw changes were experienced due to the on-going effects of Covid amongst all teams. This created numerous double-header weekends which tested our depth and resilience but ultimately bought us closer together as a team.

The connection with Central Manawa was again critical in 2022 as we encountered multiple illnesses and injuries through the season, which required replacement and additional players into short and long-term contracts throughout the season. We are enormously grateful to the Central Manawa team and management for their support and encouragement through the whole season.

Player of the Year and Coach of the Year Awards to co-captain, Kelly Jury and Head Coach, Yvette McCausland Durie were richly deserved and reflected the outstanding contributions that both made to our successful year.

National Netball League

Netball New Zealand introduced the National Netball League in 2016 to strengthen New Zealand's performance pathway by improving the depth of our playing talent through an intensely fought sub-elite competition, sitting just below the ANZ Premiership.

Coming off an extremely disappointing 2021 season, the coaching team and players had a strong desire to resume our winning ways of previous seasons. Anna Andrews-Tasola returned to the role of Head Coach determined to implement team learnings from 2021; John Atkins returned as one of two Assistant Coaches with Ngarama Milner-Olsen adding a fresh face to the group as the second Assistant Coach; and Sarona Sullivan returned to the team as team manager.

We named a long squad in October 2021 and each member was provided with a pre-season training programme. Trials took place in Wellington in January 2021 with a final long squad of 18 players being selected there.

The 2022 competition structure remained as a one and a half round competition, with the top two teams, by points, at the end of round play, to contest the Grand Final. The actual competition was initially disrupted by Covid, and the first two rounds were not played, with all teams being awarded full competition points. As a result, only 6 of 8

scheduled games were played with the Grand Final taking place in Auckland in June 2022.

Of the 6 competition matches that did take place, we won 5, losing our final round robin match to the other finalist, Mainland. In the Grand Final we turned that penultimate result around, winning against Mainland 48-41.

Overall, it has been a very satisfying season for Central Manawa – we took what we had learnt in 2021 to shape our approach to training and games and were rewarded with our fourth NNL title in 6 years. In recognition of the quality of our Central Manawa team's overall performances, Head Coach, Anna Andrews, and Centre, Ainsleyana Puleiata, were deservedly named 2002 National Netball League Coach and Player of the Year respectively.

Performance

The 2022 season has been another successful year for Netball Central Zone, in which Te Wānanga o Raukawa Pulse and Central Manawa teams, won both the ANZ Premiership and the National Netball League. This achieved our vision of being the pre-eminent Netball Zone in the High Performance space in New Zealand.

There were some standout performances by individuals, which resulted in national selections for various Pulse and NNL players in the Silver Ferns, Silver Ferns Development Squad, New Zealand Secondary School and Tongan National teams.

We recognise that we could not do this work without the quality and efforts of our members, both paid and voluntary, from across the Zone. We are enormously grateful to the Centre General Managers, Development Officers, Selectors, Coaches, Officials, Umpires and all the other support staff and volunteers who have managed to deliver community netball while also delivering some excellent development opportunities to the most talented players across the Zone.

EMERGING TALENT

For our Emerging Talent level athletes, 2022 was finally a complete season after two years of disruption and cancellations due to Covid. We were able to hold two Centre based performance tournaments and our Advanced Camp, where we identified our National Development camp nominees in preparation for the 2023 New Zealand Secondary Schools programme.

In trying to grow the Zone's Emerging Talent to help us to achieve our stated goal of producing a home-grown Pulse

team that wins, we supported Netball Kapiti Centre in re-introducing a High Performance programme in 2022, while continuing to support already established programmes in Manawatu, Wellington and Hawke's Bay.

With the appointment of John Atkins to the role of Head of Selectors, we farewelled Mrs Aroha Marsh after many years of sterling service and we are grateful that she has stayed on as our Independent Selector going forward. Mr Atkins has been able to attend all the major tournaments that have taken place in our Zone, supporting Centre representative coaches during the 2022 season as well as observing the performances of Centre representative players from across the Zone.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS COMPETITIONS

The Lower North Island Secondary School competition made a return in 2022 after two years of disruption due to Covid and was held in Hastings.

SECONDARY SCHOOL TALENT
IDENTIFICATION AND DEVELOPMENT

All Age-grade tournaments in our Zone were attended by at least one NCZ selector. This included the Marjorie Jenden tournament in Kapiti, Dale Wortman in Wellington, Betty Steffensen in Palmerston North, Viking tournament in Dannevirke, Whanganui U14 and U16 tournament, Hawke’s Bay Representative tournament in Hastings, and the North Island Junior Champs in New Plymouth. The

NNZ U18 National tournament in Christchurch and the Lower North Island Secondary Schools tournament in Hastings were also attended. This enabled the selectors to view a wide range of teams and players from across our Zone.

In 2022, we worked with Centres to continue the Performance programmes and a new Performance programme was introduced at Kapiti. The established performance hubs in Wellington and Hawke’s Bay continue to go from strength to strength. As a result, we had six players named in the New Zealand Secondary Schools squad, two from Hawke’s Bay, one from Manawatu and three from Wellington.

In trying to grow the Zone’s emerging talent to help us achieve our stated goal of producing a home-grown Pulse team that wins, we planned to hold a tournament in Palmerston North for the 5 schools that qualified for the NNZ NZSS Championships in Porirua, and three composite teams made up of emerging players from other Secondary Schools. Unfortunately, our qualifying Secondary School teams were unable to attend the tournament and so we replaced the competition with two locally based one-day tournaments. In the north, a ‘Northern Zone’ composite team made up of players from Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu, Wairarapa and Hawke’s Bay played 3 games against a Manawatu Invitation team in Palmerston North. And in Wellington, a tournament was held for 3 composite Wellington teams and a combined Hutt Valley-Kapi Mana-Kapiti team. All games were competitive, and these games assisted in selecting the players who were invited to the NCZ Advanced Camp.

Our Advanced Camp was held in Palmerston North on the 29th and 30th of October at Massey University. We were delighted to be able to offer performance extension activities to our most talented young players. A selected group of 30 secondary school players attended the overnight camp with the National Netball League extended squad attending fitness testing on day 1. From this Camp, NCZ nominated 18 players to NNZ to attend the National Development Camp to be held in Hastings on 27-29 January 2023.

As a result of grant funding from the Pub Charity, and in keeping with our goal of reducing barriers to performance, Netball Central Zone was able to offer the PULSE Talent Development Programme free of charge to all participants. We are enormously grateful to the Pub Charity for their support.

Netball Smart

The healthy heart of Netball – Based on research, NetballSmart promotes performance enhancement and injury prevention.

NetballSmart continues to grow beyond the NetballSmart Dynamic Warm Up. The program’s aims remain to be a comprehensive holistic Injury Prevention Programme (IPP). NetballSmart has multiple resources to education and support all persons involved in the development and sporting experience of all netball players. There is a whanaungatanga approach to NetballSmart and the messaging and content promote healthy netball players and supports lifelong participation in sport.

Instrumental to the success of NetballSmart and integration of NetballSmart into netball is dependent on NetballSmart being part of netball from community grassroot players, through the performance levels up to high-performance level. To expand the reach and influence of the NetballSmart programme, NetballSmart strategically increased NetballSmart funding into the wider community to support NetballSmart Centre Activators (NSCA). The project was piloted in 2021 and continued in 2022. The NSCA sits within the netball centre to facilitate specific NetballSmart strategies at the centre (and wider area as appropriate) and has massively increased the reach of the NetballSmart programme (Table 1 and Figure 1). The NetballSmart contracts will therefore extend into 2023 as well.

The key objectives of the NetballSmart programme (NSCAs working alongside NSDOs) is to:

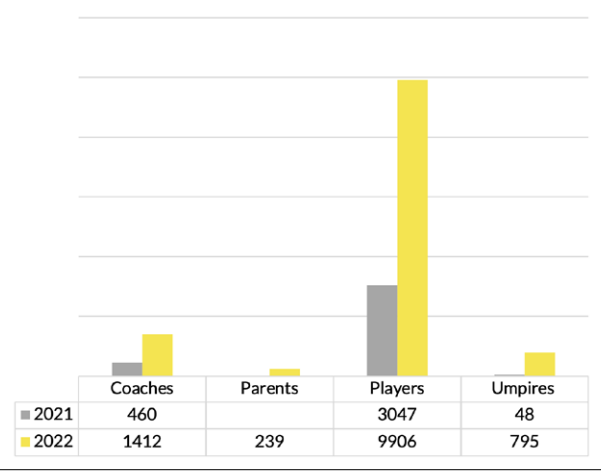
- » Connect and Inspire communities through netball.
- » Increase the NetballSmart engagement.
- » Decrease serious injuries (ankle and knee) of all netball players.

- » Increase awareness/engagement of NetballSmart philosophies into netball practices.
- » Improve player wellbeing and welfare by educating players and coaches on holistic wellbeing and decreasing overall Netball injury rate.
- » Develop physically capable and competent movers who can cope with the demands of the game.

Participation

We have been fortunate to have Bianca van Dyk lead our participation space in 2022. Bianca came into the role in April and has worked with centres in all areas of participation.

The ANZ futureFERN continues to be the cornerstone of the participation for tamariki with approximately 14 200 players from Year 1 to Year 8. Bianca supported Ohakune to implement an ANZ futureFERN programme as a satellite of Taihape Netball Centre. Netball Manawatu ran an ANZ futureFERN festival day in (XXX) to promote the programme and increase participation.

Our rangatahi numbers are relatively steady with approximately 6 930 players which is down slightly from pre covid numbers of 7 110. Bianca has been working with centres to stablish youth advisory groups or other initiatives to hear the voice of our young people. Many of the centres have defined youth voice as under 30 which is a great way to ensure succession.

Balance is Better has been a major focus for participation as we start to understand what the principles look like in real netball terms. The big themes to come out of this has been around creating quality experiences for all participants. This relates to all areas of the game, from governance and management, participation opportunities, coaching and facilities. We have seen many centres adjust their uniform policies to be more inclusive and remove a barrier from playing for those who feel uncomfortable with traditional playing uniforms.

Male participation continues to grow as centres create opportunities that work with their communities. We have seen male leagues developed; male teams entered into premier competitions, and teams able to have male players. Male participation will continue to evolve as centre boards and committees work through what it will look like in their centre.

Poipoia, the Netball in New Zealand strategy, has as one of the directions, embracing all of New Zealand’s diversity. One area where NNZ, in partnership with zones and centres, is working to provide new opportunities is with Disability Netball. Netball Wellington Centre and Netball Manawatu are both involved in a Disability Netball Pilot programme and we look forward to learning from them.

A major challenge that many centres have voiced is in relation to sideline behaviour, whether this relates to negative comments to umpires or less than ideal parent behaviour towards players. Some of our centres have been actively engaging with the Zone and RST’s to implement the Good Sport programme to address the behaviour.

Participation growth and retention will need to be a primary focus for us all as female opportunities in other sports grows, especially at the professional level. We look forward to working with the centres to strengthen the participation area in 2023.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
for the year ended 30 November 2022

1. Accounting Policies

REPORTING ENTITY

Netball Central Zone Incorporated (NCZI) is an Incorporated Society in New Zealand, incorporated in 2012. NCZI is a Public Benefit Entity. The special purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with s23(i) of the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted in the preparation and presentation of the special purpose financial statements. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

BASIS OF REPORTING

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared applying the accounting principles of accrual accounting and double entry accounting. The special purpose financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost.

The special purpose financial statements comprise of Special Purpose Statement of Financial Position, Performance, Movements in Equity and accounting policies as well as the notes to these statements. The special purpose financial statements are presented in New Zealand Dollars (NZ\$).

GOING CONCERN

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared on a going-concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business. The Members consider it appropriate for these special purpose financial statements to be prepared on a going concern basis.

GOODS AND SERVICES TAX

Figures shown in these special purpose financial statements are exclusive of GST, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable.

REVENUE RECOGNITION

The revenue from sponsorship contracts is allocated over the term of the contract. The revenue from grants that are project specific is recognised when the project occurs.

CONTRA

Contra received is to recognise in-kind contributions. They are recognised as sponsorship revenue when amounts are quantifiable in terms of the sponsorship contract.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts Receivable are shown at an amount which represents their estimated realisable value.

PLANT, EQUIPMENT AND DEPRECIATION

Plant and Equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Plant and Equipment have been written off over their estimated useful lives on a straight line basis to calculate the depreciation charge for the period as follows:

Equipment	2-5 years
Furniture and Fittings	2-15 years
IT Equipment	2-5 years

UNIFORMS

Uniforms are expensed at the time of purchase.

TAXATION

NCZI is a Non-profit body for taxation purposes under section CW 46 of the Income Tax Act 2007 and as such no taxation is payable on the profit for the year.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at banks, short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less held at call with financial institutions.

CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

There has been no change in accounting policies during the year and they have been applied on a consistent basis.
